


They continued to work hard on their routine

BLAST FROM THE PAST

Only Half-a-House Fell Down Cavein

DUTCH TOWN — The Tintic
District is filled with many
historical landmarks, but one of
the most misunderstood is the
"hole-where-the-house-fell-in,"
located south of Eureka.

The first noises from the cave-in were heard by family members, around 6 p.m. on July 21, 1922. According to Bertha Walker, sister to Bert Garbett, owner of the structure, the cause of the rumbling could not be found, so Bert, Ida, and their two children retired to bed.


Sarn they awoke to what they thought was a burglar at the back door. Urged by his wife to investigate, Bert discovered the culprit to be a large hole, 80 feet deep, where the kitchen and

adjoining utility room had caved in. If he had entered through the y kitchen he would have fallen like of most of the furniture into the opening.

Two rooms on the front of the house were moved later that morning so that the home would not be a total loss.

Like much of the area, the Garbett home was honey-combed underneath by a mine. The hole was a stope of the Bullon Beck caved up to the surface

The family belongings had been removed, the area was blasted and today some 52 years later a fence surrounds the 75 ft. wide by 600 ft. deep hole. Posted in bold red letters hangs a sign stating, "DANGEROUS, KEEP

Eureka City will hold a General Election on Tuesday, November 3, 2015, at the Eureka City Offices, 15 North Church Street, Eureka, Utah.


Municipal Offices to be voted on in the Eureka City Municipal Election on November 3, 2015:


(3) Three Council Members to serve on the Eureka C i t y Council for a four year term each.




