LETTER FROM THE MAYOR

To the good citizens of Eureka,

As we head on into 2024, I am excited for the future of our community and where the town is headed in respect to services, economic gains, business and growth.

In this letter there will be some points of goodness, and a few thoughts of where we are going to be making some changes in the near future.

I would first like to thank the good men who are involved in the City Council and the efforts, energies and leadership they provide for the community. Their dedication is truly a work of love for the community, they bring to the table a massive amount business acumen, experience and devotion. We are lucky to have each and everyone of them helping further the cause.

I would also like to thank the city employees for their service and work ethics. The city employees have been engaged in improvements externally and internally. There is a lot going on behind the scenes which is never acknowledged. I salute them for their individual efforts and dedication.

Members of our volunteer committees, thank you very, very much for your hard work, dedication and efforts. From the fireworks to the gingerbread houses, and everything in-between, those of you who are involved.... I and those with silent voices are humbly grateful.

Another group of individuals which deserve a pat on the back are the members of our community which are involved in the emergency services. Your work is truly an effort and expression of compassion and love for mankind. Every time I hear a siren or see smoke my heart drops a-little for the safety and health of those in our community which are involved with these services. Thank each and every one of you for your efforts.

Just for clarification, and reminder; the city is a business which is owned by the citizens whose management is elected. As citizens we can't afford or allow critical infrastructure to fail. There are costs and penalties involved in poor management. As a very small town, we can't allow or afford delinquency, the recovery costs come with a very steep price.

Listed below are four items which are in the forefront of discussion to improve the city's position in the future.

- Culinary water system. As you are all aware, we have air in our water. This "annoyance" (it's not dangerous) was the result of an improvement on the main service line, from the wells on the west side of town. This was the first step in resolving a missed engineering problem. It will be a few more months before the "air" problem will be resolved
- Stray dogs and cats. This continues to be a problem. We are (still) working on enforcement. As citizens, you have every right to individually protect yourselves and property.
- Main Street. Highway 6 is our cash artery to help our town improve its financial position. All of our business and landmarks are critical for our cash flow. Tourism is the target. (Sorry mining is not; those days are over) Our main street and its history (and its historic buildings) are the cash cow and pride of the community. For example, efforts like those of Doug Wright have devoted a ton of effort to improve main street. The new RV park behind Bs and the attractions like the bike museum, Porter's cabin, the caboose and the Levi mural are all points of interest which attract tourism. Then to top those attractions with items like the new war memorial banners the Halloween festival and all the tour groups which frequent our main street, all of these (and those not listed) are awesome! From the City side, there will be efforts to improve this asset in the near

future. We need every truck, car, side by sides and RVs to stop and spend a little time on main street

• Water and sewer fees. Because of inflation and the maintenance expenses needed to keep our systems repaired and improved, (to not rely perpetually on grants to keep our systems funded) in the near future there will be an adjustment to our city utility bill. I will state this very clearly and boldly WE DON'T MAKE PROFIT ON WATER AND SEWER! It's a break-even service. Because the city has very little supplemental income, we need to pay for the services through our billing. There will be much dialogue BEFORE the prices go into effect.

John F. Kennedy quoted this in 1961 "And so, my fellow Americans: ask not what your country can do for your-ask what you can do for your country."

I am going to modify his quote slightly. And so, my fellow Citizens of Eureka ask not what your town can do for you, but what you can do for your town.

Truly we can all take small efforts (I am included) to pick up a piece of trash, clean our yards, slow the negative rhetoric, be kind to our neighbors, drive slowly down the streets, keep dogs from barking incessantly, get building permits, keep the noise down after 11:00PM, volunteer and remove entitlement from our beings. Individually we communally make will make a difference.

May God bless you and your families and may God bless Eureka!

Garbage Permits

Please check your December City Utility Bill for your 2024 Eureka City Resident Solid Waste Facility Identification Card or Dump Permit.

You will need to keep this in a safe place until you need to use it at our dump facility. Please show this to the dump attendant as you enter the dump area so it can be punched if applicable. Cards will not be punched if you are just disposing of tree limbs and yard waste.

This permit allows 6 free trips to the Roll-off Bins. A \$15.00 fee per truckload and or trailer load will be charged for additional trips. The facility will be open on Saturday's only from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm.

Dead Animals, hazardous and chemical wastes, rocks or cement, tires, asphalt shingles or construction waste, will not be accepted.

Milled lumber is NOT allowed in the limb pile. If you only have a couple of small pieces of wood, it must be placed in the dumpsters that are provided. If you have construction waste, you can call Country Garbage at 801-427-0444 to order your own dumpster.

Eureka City is no longer accepting Used Oil at our facility due to misuse. If you have any used oil, you must find a certified Used Oil Collection Center to dispose of the oil.

Planning Commission Openings

Eureka City still has openings on our Planning Commission as well as our Board of Adjustments. We need good citizens that are interested in the well-being of our community to step up and accept this challenge. Training is provided. If interested, call the City Office or stop in and fill out an application.

Powers and Duties for the Planning Commission:

The planning commission shall have such powers as may be necessary to enable it to perform its functions and promote municipal planning within the city. It shall:

- 1. Prepare and recommend a general plan and amendments to the general plan to the city council as provided under the provisions of Section 10-9a-302 et seq., UCA.
- 2. Prepare and recommend the adoption of zoning ordinances and a zoning map and any amendment to said zoning ordinances and map to the city council, as provided under the provisions of Section 10-9a-302 et seq., UCA.
- 3. Administer provisions of the zoning ordinance, where specifically provided for in the zoning ordinance adopted by the city council.

- 4. Prepare and recommend adoption of subdivision regulations and amendments to those regulations to the city council, as provided under the provisions of Section 10-9a-602 et seq., UCA.
- 5. Recommend approval or denial of subdivision applications as provided under the provisions of Section 10-9a-604 et seq., UCA, in accordance with the rules and procedures set forth under the terms of the subdivision ordinance.
- 6. Prepare and recommend adoption of regulations by the city governing the approval, construction and maintenance of condominium projects, or amendments to such regulations (UCA 57-8-35).
- 7. Advise the city council on such matters as the city council directs.
- 8. Hear and decide any matters designated to it by the city council under the terms of the city's zoning ordinance or other development regulation, including the approval or denial of, or recommendations to approve or deny, development site plans and conditional use permits, and other permits as designated by the Council.
- 9. Exercise any other powers: (a) that are necessary to enable it to perform its function; or (b) delegated to it by the city council.

All Applicants are required to submit a Resume along with their application. Applications will be accepted at the City Office, 15 North Church Street, Eureka, UT. Applications are available at the City Office or you can visit our website eurekautah.org



(Ready In: 9hrs 5mins

Serves: 8

Maredients: 5

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Place beef roast in crock pot.
- Mix the dried mixes together in a bowl and 1 sprinkle over the roast.
- 3. Pour the water around the roast.
- 4. Cook on low for 7-9 hours.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 (4-5 lb) beef roast, any kind
- 1 (11/4 ounce) package brown gravy mix, dry
 - (1 1/4 ounce) package dried Italian salad dressing mix
- 1 (11/4 ounce) package ranch dressing mix, dry
- 1/2 cup water

- 5. 1. Use onion soup mix instead of ranch.

- 3. Add potatoes, carrots, mushrooms, celery and onion 2-3 hours before end.

OBITUARIES



Dr. Fred Openshaw August 30, 1938 — December 7, 2023

Beloved son, husband, father, and grandfather, Dr. Fred Henry C Openshaw, passed away on December 7, 2023. He was born in Duluth, Minnesota on August 30, 1938, to Fred Openshaw and Angeline Elizabeth Vilsmeyer Openshaw. He attended schools in Mt. Iron, Minnesota, Santaquin, Utah, San Carlos, California, Redwood City, California, Seoul, Korea, and Payson, Utah where he graduated from Payson High School. He received the following degrees: BS in Animal Science, MS in Education, and Ed.D. in Education, all earned from BYU. He retired as Superintendent of Tintic School District in 1995. He loved the community of Eureka and the support he received. He was then appointed as Superintendent of Fort Morgan School District, in Fort Morgan, Colorado. In total, he worked 40 years in education with 28 of those years as Superintendent. He was awarded by the Utah Rural Schools Association as the Outstanding Rural School Superintendent in 1984. He served in the Utah National Guard progressing to the rank of Colonel, at one point as Commandant of the OCS/NCO Academy at Camp Williams and Troop Command Commander. He also

served in the Army Reserve spending his last 3 years of service at the Pentagon bringing his total of combined military service to 39 years. He was a graduate of the Army War College, class of 1983.

Fred married the love of his life and eternal companion, Agnes Patricia Tanner on December 4, 1961, in the Salt Lake Temple. Shortly thereafter, they relocated to Tacoma, Washington while Fred was stationed at Fort Lewis on active duty in the army during the Berlin Crisis. Following his discharge from active duty they returned to Santaquin, Utah. Fred went back to teaching at Tintic High School in Eureka, Utah as well as helping on the family farm. He loved being able to work alongside his Dad and eventually his children and grandchildren on the family farm.

Although Fred was born of pioneer heritage, at age 21 he was converted and baptized as a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He loved to serve and magnified his callings which included: Stake High Councilor, Bishop of the Santaquin Center Ward for 5 years, and later served with his wife as CES Missionaries for the Utah Valley Stake Institute. He also loved serving as an Ordinance Worker at the Payson, Utah Temple.

Following World War II, at a young age, he traveled with his parents to Korea and Japan. This sparked a love of travel throughout his entire life. He especially loved Disneyland and going on cruises with his family.

Organizations that Fred belonged to included: American Legion Post 84, Sons of the Utah Pioneers Squaw Peak Chapter, Eureka-Tintic UT Elks Lodge #711, Santaquin Library Board, and Summit Creek Irrigation.

He is preceded in death by his parents, Fred and Angeline Openshaw, and his half-siblings, Glen Openshaw, Carl Openshaw, and Darlene Parker. In addition, he was preceded in death by his aunt, Orchard Marie Openshaw Howard, and uncle, William Franklin Openshaw who he considered like siblings. He is also preceded in death by his beautiful granddaughter, Hope Elise Quigley. He is survived by his wife, Patricia of 62 years, and his children, Teresa Openshaw Hansen, Fred Colvin (Carlotte) Openshaw, Carolyn O. (Scott) Quigley, Debra O. (David) Wasson, Reece Eli (Amber) Openshaw, and Mark Henry (Kristi) Openshaw. He is also survived by his 18 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren.

The family would like to express their gratitude to Canyon Home Care & Hospice and especially to Paige Steele who provided much support and comfort.

Funeral services will be held Friday, December 15, 2023, at 11:00 am at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints Downtown Building, 90 South 200 East, Santaquin, Utah.
